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this study addresses 19th century european art along with the forces that informed it after introducing historical events and cultural and artistic trends from about 1760 that would exert their influence well into the new century petra ten doesschate chu discusses the advent of modernism and its many interpretations she considers the changing relationship between artist and audience evolving attitudes towards the depiction of nature and the confrontation of european artists with non western art due to expanding trade and travel understanding of the art as do sidebars that focus

on specific works techniques or historical circumstances although painting and sculpture are central in her narrative chu also covers a broad scope of visual culture including architecture decorative arts photography and graphic design a timeline glossary and bibliography listing not only books but also films related to the period complete the volume

encompassing the socio political cultural background of the period this title takes a look at the careers of the old masters and many lesser known artists the book covers artistic developments across six countries and examines in detail many of the artworks on display

this innovative introduction examines the profession of the nineteenth century american artist and audience reception of their work works of art by familiar names such as thomas eakins and winslow homer are discussed in detail within the larger arena of visual culture as are key works by recently discovered artists such as harriet hosmer the thematic approach focuses on portraiture landscape painting the american west and commemorative art then goes on to examine the ways in which painters responded to major social and economic changes resulting from the rapid transformation from an agriculturally based former colony to an industrialized imperial power with an evolving democracy

nineteenth century in all of its complex and sometimes repugnant sensibilities they disrupt traditional art historical categories and methodologies and highlight topics that have been long ignored and overlooked making waves demonstrates in no uncertain terms that art historians still have much to say to each other and to their readers and that nineteenth century art has only begun to be explored in all its complexity and variety 00laurinda s dixon is professor emerita of art history at syracuse university new york her scholarship considers the intersection of art and science particularly alchemy herbalism medicine astrology and music from the fifteenth through the nineteenth centuries she is the author of many articles book chapters and ten books

a study of the representation of education in material culture at a period of considerable change and growth on the facade of chartres cathedral serene personifications of the arts of grammar rhetoric dialectic music arithmetic geometry and astronomy present passers by with a vision of education as an improving process leading to greater knowledge of god the arts proved a popular subject in medieval imagery and were included in manuscripts stained glass and luxury metalwork objects as well as on the facades of churches these idealized figures contrast with many textual accounts of education in which authors recorded the hardships of student poverty and the temptations of drink and women to be found in the cities where teachers were increasingly establishing themselves thisbook considers how and why education was explored in the art and architecture of the twelfth century through analysis of imagery in a wide range of media it examines how teachers and students sought to use images to enhance their reputations and the status of their studies it also investigates how the ideal models often set out in imagery compared with contemporary practice in an era that saw significant changes beginning with a shift away from monastic education and culminating in the appearance of the first universities laura cleaver is senior lecturer in manuscript studies institute of english studies university of london
